7 Projects by Local Groups Selected to Receive Funding: Challenge Program

An interview with the chairman of the Review Committee

Tell us about the selection criteria this year.

The criteria we evaluate have not changed much, but our explanation of what we are looking for has improved over the years, letting the people understand our aims better. Many groups consulted with us before applying, which I think benefited both the committee and the applicants.

What makes Minamiboso's program special?

There are many programs like this on the city level around Japan, but Minamiboso's is a rare example of a long-running program in a rural community. Additionally, I don't think there are many other programs that continue to improve the quality of its projects year after year. The projects over the last nine years have been diverse, and the ways they have utilized local resources to solve problems has been fantastic.

What are you looking forward to with this year's groups? Thinking about the future of the program, more and more groups have teamed up to secure funding. I do not believe these groups only intend to move on in the selection process. They are able to do this because of careful cooperation with other groups and local improvement associations. I hope everyone continues to give it their all.

Public Evaluation for the Challenge Program

The public evaluation of group project proposals for the "Citizen-Proposed Community Improvement Challenge Program" was held on May 16 at the Tomiura Genki Club.

This program, as part of a community improvement initiative based on cooperation and mutual trust between citizens and the city, was started in 2007 and is now in its 9th year. There is a First Step Course, which supports projects by two new citizen's groups (maximum ¥50,000), and the Challenge Course, which helps five established groups further develop and improve their activities (maximum ¥300,000).

Applicants to the First Step Course are evaluated on their written applications, while applicants to the Challenge Course are evaluated on both their written applications and a public presentation. Every group gave impressive presentations, making good use of pictures and slides, and communicated their ideas to the judges with enthusiasm.

All of the groups that presented were selected to receive funding.



Composting, Popularizing Core Training, Handmade Sea Kayaks, A Local Film Festival, Forest Preservation, Foot Paths, and more

Selected Groups and their Projects

First Step Course

1. Awa Funkorogashi

Composting Kitchen Garbage

This group intends to reduce garbage and create a culture of recycling by promoting composting. They will hold composting workshops and talks at cafes. (Miyoshi)

2. Core Training Club

Invigorating Minamiboso's Children with Basic Fitness

This group will encourage healthy growth of the body and mind by teaching core training exercises to elementary and middle school students. They will create a town-wide environment of healthy behavior through meetings and social gatherings. (Tomiyama)

Challenge Course

1. Minamiboso Kaiyuu Club Handmade Sea Kayaks on Tomiura Bay

This group will show us a new way to enjoy Tomiura bay: hand-made sea kayaks. They will hold ocean safety, kayaking, and kayak-making courses. They will also do projects for the public good, such as beach cleaning and installing and removing erosion control nets. (Tomiura, 1st year)

3. Minamiboso Film Locatto

Minamiboso Sazanami Film Festival

This group will host a film festival of local works as well as a monthly film screening. They also run a website, invite film makers, recruit extras and staff, and offer support to film makers. There will also be lectures and gatherings to discuss on-set lunches and the making of independent films. (Tomiyama, 2nd year)

2. Takatsukayama Boukatsu Club

Improving the view at Takatsukayama

This group aims to improve the hiking trail on Mt. Takatsukayama, making it a place where both locals and visitors can mingle and enjoy nature. They are also restoring the view from the summit and making maps for the Shiramazu Hiking Course. (Chikura, 2nd year)

4. Onuki Kodou no Kai

Discover the wonders of Onuki! The Foot Path Project

This group will regularly give a guided tour of the foot path through the Onuki district of Chikura. They will create new walking courses and maps, catalogue rare plants, plant cherry and maple trees, and develop products that use the area's unique resources.

5. Onuki Harunakai

Saving Money for the Mountains and Forests

This group grows edible nanohana flowers along the Awa Greenline for people to pick and eat every year. They also plant plum trees and sunflowers to beautify the local scenery. They also run a farmer's market once a month, maintain scenic viewpoints and walking courses, and run a children's nature club. The Onuki Haruna Matsuri is in mid-March. (Chikura, 3rd year)

Revised Requirements for Exemptions and Reductions to Public Facility Fees

Starting October 1, a revised policy on exemptions and reductions to public facility fees will go into effect. This policy is part of a financial and administrative reform initiative to provide efficient administrative services by charging only those who use the services.

The Revised Requirements

Total Exemption

- 1. Activities run by or with the city or a body related to the city
- 2. Any other local public organization
- 3. Public organizations using the facility for a city project
- 4. Minamiboso nursery schools, preschools, elementary schools, and middle schools
- Minamiboso Youth Clubs and groups for children's health of middle school age and up
- 6. Volunteer groups related to city social welfare

Preventing Dengue Fever

Dengue fever is caused by the dengue virus, which is transferred by mosquitos. After a mosquito bites someone infected with the dengue virus, the virus multiplies in its body and is transmitted to the next person they bite. The most likely carrier of the virus in Japan is the tiger mosquito, which tends to be active during the day and lives in shady areas with plants. They will bite people who come within up to 100 meters of their habitat. The mosquitoes grow to adulthood and start biting between mid-May and late October, but they can also appear after sudden increases in temperature at other times of year.

- Route of Infection
- Not transmitted directly from person to person
- Transmitted by mosquitoes who have bitten infected people
- Incubation Period
- Symptoms start within 2 to 15 days (and usually between 3 and 7 days)
- Symptoms
- Sudden fever, severe headache, joint pain, muscle pain, rash
- 10%-50% of infected people present symptoms
- Prognosis is usually good, but can sometimes become more serious
- Treatment
- Symptomatic treatment (managing pain, fever, and other symptoms as they appear)
- · There is no effective vaccine
- Prevention
- Wear long sleeves and pants. Avoid sandals and other clothing that exposes bare skin.
- Use mosquito repellant both inside and outside
- Make sure to kill mosquitoes that get inside
- Avoid creating a breeding habitat for mosquitoes (they prefer to lay their eggs in small puddles, such as rain water gathered in empty cans. You can decrease the amount of mosquitoes born near your home by eliminating stagnant water.)

*We can all help reduce the mosquito population by cleaning gutters in our towns.

銃

私はアメリカ人なので、「アメリカで銃を何丁持っている?」「銃は懐かしい?」と日本人にたまに質問されます。アメリカが銃文化で 悪名高いのは分かりますが、私は銃に反対しているので、その質問が少し気になります。

実は、私も家族も銃を持っていません。私の友達の家族もほとんど持っていませんが、銃を持っている知り合いでも、「自己防衛」 のために携帯するのではなく、狩猟や射撃場での練習用に持っています。最近見たニュースでは、「銃を所持する」と答えたアメリカ 人は24%で、「自分は持っていないが家庭内の人が所持する」と答えた人は13%でした。世界的に高い所持率だと思いますが、アメリ カ人の皆が銃を持っているという印象に比べてかなり低いでしょう。

私は、自己防衛のために拳銃を使うというのは欠点のある考え方だと思います。拳銃は強盗や殺人の道具となるので、民間人が 使ったら自衛や正義には絶対にならないでしょう。アメリカでは物議をかもす態度ですが、日本のような銃を持たない法律は安全な 国を作る為に必要だと思います。やはり、私にとっては日本の治安の良い所は魅力の一つです。

日本の安全性は銃に関する厳しい規制によるものだと思いませんか?

Guns

While living in Japan, I am sometimes asked questions like "How many guns do you own?" and "Do you miss your guns?" simply because I am an American. While I understand that America is infamous for its gun culture, as an American who is opposed to guns myself, I get a little bothered by these questions.

The fact is, I do not own a gun and neither does anyone in my family. Most of my friends' families don't have guns either, and the ones who do, have them for hunting or for shooting at a firing range; in other words, they don't carry hand guns with them for "self defense." According to a recent survey I read, only 24% of Americans said they own a gun, while 13% said that someone in their household owns one. These are still high numbers, but it is far from the stereotype that we all have guns.

I personally think that using guns for self defense is a flawed philosophy. Guns are tools for robbery and murder that can rarely, if ever, be used by common citizens for defense and justice. This is a controversial stance in America, but I believe that the laws and restrictions in Japan make this country a safer place. This sense of security is something I value about living in Japan.

Pyramid Schemes

Pyramid schemes, where higher ranking members profit off of lower ranking members, are illegal. The reason for this is that they continually add members, creating new victims to take the burden.

Another kind of scheme called "multilevel marketing" is very similar to a pyramid scheme. In these systems, you recruit new members whose merchandise costs are partially paid to you. However, because total enrollment has a limit, someone will always end up as a victim and not make their money back.

Multilevel marketing is not explicitly illegal. However, because of the dangers associated with it, the right to cancel and withdraw is strictly regulated.

If someone offers you an opportunity for "an easy way to make money on the side by inviting your friends," do not believe them. If you have enrolled in what you believe to be a pyramid scheme, make sure to withdraw as soon as you suspect it.

Minamiboso Film Locatto was established in April last year to reinvigorate the local economy by commissioning films.
